Susan Chunick

Susan Chunick is the Director, Research and Evaluation Office. Susan began her career as a physical therapist, graduating from Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario, and worked on both coasts before obtaining a M.Sc. in Health Planning and Administration from the University of British Columbia in 1982. She was Head of the Physiotherapy Division, School of Rehabilitation Medicine at UBC from 1983 to 1985 and carried out a program of back care education research during that time. Susan was also actively involved in physiotherapy professional activities, including a term as President of the Physiotherapy Association of B.C. Following a brief 10 year respite as a stay at home mom, Susan worked as a health services consultant and then as a manager for Customer and Market Research at the Insurance Corporation of British Columbia (ICBC), carrying out a number of evaluation research studies for the ICBC soft tissue injury program as well as market research studies involving customer satisfaction and branding. Prior to joining FH in 2005, Susan was Manager for the Clinical Research Ethics Board at UBC overseeing the review of all clinical research conducted by UBC and UBC-affiliated investigators.

Since March 2005, Susan has put into place the research administration and development infrastructure at Fraser Health that now supports 138 principal and 125 co-investigators. This includes a policy framework for conducting research in FH, administrative standard operating procedures for ethical review, departmental/facility approvals, grant administration [including CIHR granting status], contract review, research development and inter-institutional research collaboration agreements with UBC, SFU, UFV, TWU, UVIC, UNBC, RRU, and McGill University to date. An extensive education program has resulted in partnerships with the MSFHR Population Health Networks for Aging and Women's Health. One of Susan's main goals has been to develop research capacity within FH. In this regard, the Health Research Intelligence Unit comprised Michael Wasdell, Epidemiologist and Grant Facilitator/Writer and formerly Rae Spiwak, Epidemiologist, has been extremely successful in providing consultation to both decision makers, who are interested in evaluation and policy research, and researchers. Susan was successful in obtaining a \$50,000 grant from the Vancouver Foundation which FH used to launch its successful seed grant competition for new researchers. She has also obtained a \$5,000 CIHR grant to conduct an environmental scan of the clinical integration of service delivery in regional health authorities across Canada. Although a work in progress, the development of a sustainable research infrastructure within FH has evolved to the point that attention will begin to be focused on knowledge transfer of research and evaluation research evidence and prioritizing preferred areas of research for FH. This developmental work will undertake to build consensus from the 'grass-roots' and from the 'top down' over the course of the next year.

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Susann Camus

Susann Camus, Research Team Planning Strategist on contract with Fraser Health, draws on 15 years of experience in human resources management and adult education and five years in health sciences to guide four research teams: The Quality of Dying Research Team, The Total Knee Arthroplasty Research Team, The Workplace Disability Research Team, and the Healthcare Workers' Safety Toolkit Research Team. Susann is halfway through a Master's in Public Health at Simon Fraser University, specializing in health services and health policy. Prior to joining Fraser Health, she worked as a Research Associate and as a Director of Academic Planning for SFU's Faculty of Health Sciences. Awarded the 2009 Emmett Hall Memorial Foundation Award for best master's paper at the annual Canadian Association of Health Services & Policy Research, Susann is actively involved in research on social inequities, health policy, and health human resources. She has a master's degree in English from the University of Toronto and postgraduate certificates - in human resources management from Concordia University, in adult education from St. Francis Xavier University, and in cooperative work relationships from Queen's University. Susann is a member of the BC Human Resources Management Association, where she volunteers as a mentor.

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Rosa Haywood

Rosa Haywood is the Research Ethics Coordinator, Fraser Health Research and Evaluation Office. Prior to joining FH in 2005, Rosa Haywood was a Research Assistant to the Cardiology Research Group at the Royal Alexandra Hospital, Edmonton, Alberta, one of Canada's most well known clinical trial sites. She is currently a member of the Society of Clinical Research Associates, SoCRA. Rosa now coordinates all activities related to the FH ethics review process and monitoring of regulated clinical trials to ensure that the procedures for ethical review and for Health Canada inspection of regulated clinical trials are implemented effectively and efficiently for the FH research community. Rosa also supports and sustains the quality of the ethical review by implementing quality control measures for document review.

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Tamara MacDonald

Tamara MacDonald has been a Quality Improvement/Patient Safety Consultant- Special Projects for Fraser Health since 2005. Tamara holds undergraduate degrees in Medical Laboratory Science, Health Administration, an Advanced Certificate in Clinical Chemistry, and a Master's of Science- Health Service Research: Evaluation and Health Service Outcomes from the University of Toronto, Faculty of Medicine. Tamara's 25 years in healthcare includes being the Immunochemistry Specialist in the private sector (MDS Inc.) for 15 years, moving to the public sector, specifically education, research and knowledge translation in HIV/AIDS and Mental Health and Addictions (provincial and national) for 7 years. Prior to Fraser Health, she was with the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH), in Toronto, ON, where she developed a knowledge translation and evaluation framework for CAMH, received a special grant to launch Ontario's first Knowledge Transfer Exchange Network and evaluated the uptake of best practices for treating Concurrent Disorders in Ontario. Due to her passion and commitment to the field, Tamara has played many roles at various conferences, including being an invited delegate to the National Forum on Knowledge Transfer, hosted by the Canadian Health Services Foundation. She is highly active with teaching/mentoring with the Canadian Healthcare Association, regarding health service management and other organizations/groups regarding the integration of evaluation and knowledge exchange.

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Michelle Purdon

Michelle Purdon is Manager of Library Services for Fraser Health based at Abbotsford Regional Hospital. She has a BA in English and Political Science and a Certificate in Technical Communication, both from Simon Fraser University, as well as a Master of Library and Information Studies from the University of British Columbia. Michelle has several years experience teaching library research skills classes in both health care and academic settings. Prior to joining Fraser Health, Michelle worked as a medical librarian with the Saskatoon Health Region, primarily providing outreach services, and as a contract health researcher. She is particularly passionate about the intersection of technology and health care, the role for medical libraries in the process of knowledge transfer and exchange (KTE), as well as the promotion of evidence-based practice.

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Matthew Querée

Matthew Querée joined Fraser Health Authority in April 2009 as one of two Research Team Planning Strategists funded by the Michael Smith Health Authority Capacity Building Initiative. He is developing Research Teams in 3 specific service areas: Rehabilitation, Pharmacy, and Mental Health & Addictions. Prior to joining Fraser Health, Matthew was a Research Associate and Project Manager in the Faculty of Health Sciences at Simon Fraser University's Centre for Applied Research in Mental Health and Addiction (CARMHA) since January 2006, and a Social Science Researcher at the University of British Columbia since 2001. He has designed quantitative and qualitative research for a variety of projects in health services system improvement, specifically in the areas of homelessness and housing outcomes, primary health care reform, substance use, mental health, and corrections. Matthew has collaborated extensively with Provincial Ministries on initiatives including the development of BC Standards and an Evaluation Framework for Assertive Community Treatment, and he is a contributing author to the Core Information Document on Cognitive-Behavioural Therapy. His main interests continue to be influencing the process of health care decision-making with policy-relevant research and evidence.

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Marika Sandrelli

Marika Sandrelli, the Coordinator of the Knowledge Translation & Exchange Strategy -Fraser Health's Mental Health & Addictions, has worked in community education and development for 28 years since 1980 since she embarked on a project overseas in Brazil. Since then, she has worked in Mexico, Zimbabwe, Sudan, Romania, Ukraine, Toronto (Jane Finch Corridor & Parkdale), Vancouver (DTES) and rural northern Ontario (Moose Factory and Moosonee). She taught at SFU's Community Education Department at Harbour Centre. Most of her work has been with the most socially excluded people, including those struggling with poverty, mental health and addiction issues.

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Magdalena Swanson

Magdalena Swanson, Research and Grant Development Facilitator, obtained an MSc in Medical Microbiology from the University of Manitoba. She obtained further biomedical research experience at the University of Calgary and the University of British Columbia in the fields of molecular biology, stem cell research, neural development, bone and cartilage development, and bioinformatics. She gained extensive proposal review and development experience as Research Development Facilitator with the Child and Family Research Institute in Vancouver. Her work involved consulting on successful proposals for several funding agencies, including Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research (MSFHR), Canadian Diabetes Association (CDA), and Canadian Foundation for Innovation (CFI). Magdalena was selected to serve as a CIHR Community Reviewer, a volunteer position that ensures public accountability and transparency of the CIHR peer review process. She is also a member of the Canadian Association of University Research Administrators (CAURA).

Magdalena joined the RAD team in March 2009. In her role, she advises FH personnel on research and proposal development, and provides research grant administration. She serves as a liaison between FH and national and local funding organizations. She consults on post-award activities for research teams within FH, and works with groups to identify appropriate funding opportunities in areas ranging from work place health and safety, to prevention of falls and fractures, to pharmacy services. Magdalena uses her group facilitation skills to support research priority setting efforts of FH programs and departments. Her projects have included management and administration of the FH Seed Grant and Strategic Imperatives Grant competitions, where she also served as the scientific review committee chair. In addition, Magdalena is integral to RAD's education efforts as the developer and presenter of several workshops. Her strategic efforts include the identification and facilitation of new research funding and collaboration ventures for FH.

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Dr. Aaron Tejani, PharmD

Dr. Aaron Tejani is Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD), Drug Information and Clinical Research Coordinator for FH Pharmacy. Aaron completed his undergraduate Pharmacy Degree at University of British Columbia in 1994 and then went on to complete his Doctor of Pharmacy Degree (PharmD) at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska. He also stayed in Omaha to complete his Post-PharmD Internal Medicine/Pharmacy Practice residency and returned to Vancouver in 1998. Since then he served as the Clinical Pharmacist in Critical Care at Burnaby Hospital up to 2006. In Aaron's current role he serves as a support to the BC Health Authority Pharmacy & Therapeutics Committee (conducts and guides the production of systematic reviews of therapies/interventions). Aaron currently sits on the Fraser Health Research Ethics board and is a researcher with the Therapeutics Initiative at the University of British Columbia. He has a keen interest in critical appraisal of the biomedical literature and has authored and published several systematic reviews of drug therapy.

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Leah Thomas-Olson

Leah Thomas-Olson is an Ergonomist and the Research Evaluation Coordinator within the Workplace Health Department at Fraser Health. Leah graduated from UCFV in December 2003 with a Bachelor of Kinesiology degree. She has been involved with various projects in the department including the development of resources for the Safe Client Handling Program, the Healthy Workplace Initiative and the evaluation of various programs in the department. Leah's area of interest is occupational health and safety and she is passionate about prevention.

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Michael Wasdell

Michael Wasdell is the Fraser Health Epidemiologist, Research Administration and Development. Michael has extensive experience both as a clinician and researcher in pediatric neurosciences. Michael obtained his MA in Experimental Psychology at Wilfrid Laurier University. With such academic preparation in behavioural sciences and quantitative methods, he has provided research consultation and statistical services both in Canada and the United States at academic institutions, university-affiliated hospitals and to pharmaceutical companies. Michael worked five years at the University of British Columbia in clinical trials development and management and continues to collaborate with investigators affiliated with UBC and the BC Child and Family Research Institute. Michael's contributions to the health research community are reflected in peer reviewed articles, book chapters and proceedings from international and national conferences.

Since March 2006, Michael has provided consultation to Fraser Health personnel who are interested in developing research projects and attaining funding to support these activities. Through his role in the planning and implementation of organizational research structures to support and evaluate the building of research capacity within Fraser Health, Michael possesses a solid understanding of the factors that promote research use and production among health authority staff. Michael consults with Fraser Health researchers in all fields, providing guidance and direction in the development of qualitative and quantitative research methodologies and statistics. Michael also consults with Fraser Health staff on the design and analysis of the evaluation of programs, interventions and services, and is a co-investigator on a wide variety of research projects.
